Dear friends,

My pastoral care professor in seminary, created a bumper sticker, "WIGIAT." It stands for "Where is God in all of this?" The "this" being: life, the world, the church, the good, the bad, the ugly, the joy, the fear and so on.

It seems to me to be an appropriate question to ask often these days. Over this past year, we have witnessed violence rip and tear through this world and this country ranging from: Ferguson, Staten Island, Baltimore, Charleston, Chattanooga, Virginia and the so many more states and cities that never even make the news. We feel horror at what we see through the terror of the Islamic State group (ISIS) or the breaking of hearts at natural disasters in Nepal and so many other places in the world.

William Sloane Coffin reminds us, "The world, of course, is in a frightful mess, but because of us, not because of God. God could only clean up the mess by taking away our freedom. But without freedom where could love be? So paradoxically, it is because God is a loving God that there is so much suffering in the world. But because God is a loving God he is suffering too, and suffering also through the bodies and souls of his creatures, which is why Paul writes, 'For while we live we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake."

Each and every time we gather for worship, in our midst, we have a profound opportunity that the world cannot give. We gather around the gifts of God's grace; these gifts that remind us "God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. *There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear.*" (1 John 4:16,18). Worship provides us with that profound opportunity to be reminded that we are not alone in the "this" of life. Worship provides us with an opportunity to be reminded, "WIGIAT" that God was, is and will be forever with us.

The "God with us" dwells in, with and among us. We are not alone. This is made so beautifully manifest each time we gather as the assembled body of Christ. We bring the brokenness of our own lives, the brokenness of this world, and the brokenness of our relationships with on another; we bring this and join it together with

Christ's own broken body, and we are re-membered. We are made new. We are fed. We are sent forth to remind this broken world that God is in our midst. We need not fear, for perfect love has already cast that aside.

May it be so!

# WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND THE CHURCH?

## TUNE UP worship band gathering

On Sat. Aug. 8, the TUNE UP worship band gathering was held. More than 100 worship musicians, pastors, sound techs and video techs assembled on the campus of Westbury United Methodist Church in Houston for a multidenominational training event. For the third year in a row, the event was organized by the Worship Excellence Team of the ELCA Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Gulf Coast Synod to improve the quality of band-led worship in smaller churches.



Participants came from across Texas including San Antonio, Austin and the Houston vicinity, and represented more than 20 congregations from Lutheran, Nazarene, Baptist, United Methodist and nondenominational church bodies.

The gathering began with opening worship and a panel discussion about the issues facing church musicians today. Then everyone divided into instrumental/vocal/tech tracks and conceptual tracks. The instrumental tracks were divided by specific area (worship leader, acoustic guitar, electric guitar, bass guitar, keyboard, drums, Latin percussion, vocals, sound tech and video tech). Conceptual track offerings included sessions on hospitality in worship, multicultural worship, creative worship planning, and loops and multi-tracks in worship. During the "Coaching for Bands" session, a volunteer church band received feedback and help with their music from a panel of track leaders. Then an "Instant Band" was formed from volunteer participants who had never played together. They were able to learn and arrange a song on the fly. An optional post-event included a tour of the worship technology at Houston's First Baptist Church.

One attendee commented, Great clinic! Thank you very much! My band mates and I returned home fired up for the future of our band!








Registration is now open for fall classes at **The Center for Worship & Music Studies**, a new kind of training program committed to supporting the full diversity of musical gifts in the church.
